The Daily Telegraph and The Evening Standard mention the inquest into the death of a woman who died after surgeon Chinh Nguyen cut an artery in her heart. Dr Nguyen is currently suspended by the GMC's Interim Orders Panel, though the article does not mention this.

A report from the BMA has stated that the fight against 'super bugs' is hampered by hospital's having to meet strict patient treatment targets. They say this gets in the way of proper cleaning and limits infection control.

The Guardian reports that the Care Quality Commission's investigation into the case of Dr Ubani, the doctor whose mistakes when "exhausted" after travelling to work here from Germany killed patient Code A is to be widened. They are looking into the care provided by Ubani to two other patients and to the management of Take Care Now, the company who hired Ubani.
