Stiff upper lip blamed for male cancer toll

Men are 40 per cent more likely to die from cancer than women because their "stiff upper lip" attitude stops them seeing the doctor in time. They are also around 70 per cent more likely to die from cancers that affect both men and women, and are far more likely to develop the disease in the first place. The findings are based on cancer rates in the population and are part of a report from the National Cancer Intelligence Network, Cancer Research UK and the Men's Health Forum.
