Nottingham University Hospitals has paid a "substantial" undisclosed sum to a man whose brain tumour their doctors failed to spot. The *Daily Mirror* reports that medics told Adrian Underwood that he was suffering migraines and advised him to take migraine pills, but his cancer was spotted later when he visited Nottingham's eye hospital concerned by his deteriorating sight.
