## Press Cuttings Summary

### Direct Mentions

#### Print & Online Mentions

The *Eastern Daily Press* mentions the GMC's draft guidance on End of Life Care issues (currently out for consultation) and how this deals with premature babies, in a piece which was placed by the Press Office. The story reveals that 55 per cent of those questioned in a GMC/mumsnet.com survey said parents should have the final say when it comes to withdrawing treatment for critically ill babies.

There are national and regional mentions of the following fitness to practise hearings:

- Dr George Murty - allegations of poor treatment and communication during surgery (hearing ongoing)
- Dr Peter Rowlands – Interim Orders Panel meeting (warning issued)
- Dr Jane Barton - alleged irresponsible prescribing to patients at Gosport War Memorial Hospital (hearing ongoing)
- Dr Jonathan Chahal - allegations of procuring and abusing drugs (hearing is ongoing).

A letter in *The News* (Portsmouth) asks for Sir Peter Viggers to apologise to the families of people who died at Gosport War Memorial Hospital, in connection with the ongoing hearing for Dr Jane Barton.

### Broadcast Mentions

ITV's 'Granada Tonight' show yesterday mentioned that the mother of a woman who died of deep vein thrombosis after taking a contraceptive pill may take this case to the GMC. She says her daughter was not briefed about the possible side effects of the drug.

BBC Radio Ulster's 'Talkback' show yesterday afternoon featured a phone-in on the issue of doctors discussing their religious beliefs with patients and the GMC was briefly mentioned.

### Other News

The results of the GP Patient Survey are to be published today. The survey will penalise financially any GP surgery where patients have faced a delay in their appointments. The BMA has criticised the survey as not being representative or accurate and for punishing surgeries that actually need more funding to improve services.

There are several stories in the national press about the youngest person to die from 'swine' flu. The girl was nine years old, died at Birmingham Children's Hospital and already had other significant health problems (*Guardian*).

Religious leaders including the Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr Rowan Williams, have spoken out against plans to debate the assisted suicide laws as a potential threat to "vulnerable people at serious risk" (*Daily Mail*). *The Daily Telegraph* reports that several peers have also added their voices to this criticism.

There is a brief mention in *The Daily Telegraph* that an 11 month old boy discharged from hospital with meningitis has died of the condition. Trafford General Hospital has launched an investigation.

There is a letter in *The Scotsman* in which the author expresses their anger at "bible-thumping" doctors wanting to discuss their spirituality with patients, in relation to an earlier article in the newspaper.

The *Scotsman* of 29 June reported that Labour MSP Lord George Foulkes has backed the SNP's call for powers identified in the Calman Commission report as being suitable for devolution to Holyrood to be transferred as soon as possible. However, the piece states that Lord Foulkes has also called for powers identified for transfer back to Westminster, 'including registration of medical professionals', to be transferred quickly too:

[GPs fear they will lose millions if patients complain about surgery waiting times](#)

Family doctors will lose millions of pounds in funding because of complaints from patients over the waiting times for appointments. Most general practices around the country are expected to suffer losses - some as much as £25,000 - when the results of a survey are released today. The GP Patient Survey, the first to penalise financially doctors who receive negative responses, is expected to cost practitioners more than £10 million and in the worst cases could force cutbacks such as staff redundancies. Practices that receive less than 60 per cent of positive responses to the two key questions would sacrifice all the money available as part of the quality and outcomes framework, which pays doctors for achieving service targets. The BMA predicted an average-sized practice could face losses of £7,500, while larger lists could lose more than £10,000. Hundreds of practices are expected to appeal.

[Girl, 9, dies after catching swine flu as confirmed cases in UK pass 6,000](#)

A nine-year-old girl has become the third person to die in the UK after catching swine flu, as the total of confirmed cases in the country passed 6,000. The HPA announced an increase of 1,604 in the number of patients in England confirmed with swine flu to 4,968 since the last figures, released on Friday. Andy Burnham, the health secretary, said: "Tragic as today's death is, I would like to emphasise that, across England, the majority of swine flu cases have not been severe." In other news, a handful of ball boys and girls at Wimbledon, where attendance has reached 40,000 a day, have been advised to stay at home after suffering flu-like symptoms.
